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of translations. In the preface and/or introduction of every edition of the ancient epic since's Heaney's publication references it with praise. The general consensus is that it is both accurate, clear, and preserves the original better than most other options.

One of Heaney's most startling innovations is in his translation of the very first word of Beowulf. In Old English it is "Hwaet", literally meaning "what" but used as an interjection to begin a story. Many early translators, perhaps influenced by the King James Bible, use "Lo," and then launch into their tale.
