Since recovery for the vast majority of patients under the care of these nurses isn't generally feasible, relieving patient and familial suffering via comprehensive appraisals of their spiritual, psychosocial, and physical needs is extremely important for the palliative care nurse, which can be a delicate task.

Nurses provide palliative care in a variety of roles and settings, on acute wards, in specialist units, in family homes and in children's hospices. Some nurses will have specialist palliative care roles while others will integrate the care into existing roles e.g. in high dependency units or neonatal units.
