Our Documents - Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo (1848)

On February 2, 1848, the United States and Mexico signed the treaty of Guadalupe-Hidalgo. In the Treaty, Mexico agreed to surrender all claims to Texas and accept the Rio Grande as the boundary of that state. Mexico also agreed to sell its New Mexico and Upper California territories to the United States at a price of \$15 million.

Lasting Effects of the Treaty of Guadalupe-Hidalgo ...

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Pressing on with negotiations, Trist successfully concluded the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo and it was signed February 2, 1848, in the Basilica of Guadalupe at Villa Hidalgo. Terms of the Treaty: Receiving the treaty from Trist, Polk was pleased with its terms and grudgingly passed it to the Senate for ratification.

Finally, on Feb. 2, 1848, the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo was signed, establishing the Rio Grande and not the Nueces River as the U.S.-Mexican border.
